


escap prepared a follow up discussion paper on the barriers and opportunities facing women MSMEs in Samoa. Examining and drawing on existing literature and studies, the paper discusses the key barriers and opportunities for women entrepreneurs in Samoa. The paper also presents a number of policy recommendations and strategies for addressing gaps and leveraging opportunities that will further support creating an enabling environment for women entrepreneurs in Samoa. The paper also contributed to the discussions held during the stakeholder-consultation in August 2020. An infographic summary of the paper can be found here.



CATALYZATION OF WOMEN'S ENTREPRENEURSHIP ESCAP formalized its partnership with Ministry of Commerce, Industry and Labour (MCIL), Samoa through a letter of agreement that provides the framework for implementing project activities in Samoa as part of the policy pillar. The areas of focus under the LOA are: A baseline study of women led MSMEs in Samoa to estimate the number of women entrepreneurs in Samoa and the nature of barriers faced by them. This study, first of its kind in Samoa, will provide support to policymakers and key institutions in the design and implementation of policies and programmes that support women entrepreneurs. An implementation strategy to support women entrepreneur specific goals of the MSME Policy and Strategy 2020 will be developed. ESCAP will provide targeted support in promoting registration of women entrepreneurs in the informal sector by reviewing the business registration processes in Samoa.

FORMALIZED MECHANISMS

Building on the partnership with MCIL, a rapid assessment on enabling policy environment for women led MSMEs including impact of COVID-19 has been conducted building on the various studies undertaken previously. Specifically, the assessment has generated policy recommendations and actionable measures for MCIL to consider in addressing the impact of the COVID-19 on WMSMEs as well as their long-term development.

In partnership with MCIL and Samoa Bureau of Statistics, ESCAP is undertaking a baseline study to provide evidence on the number of women-led businesses in Samoa as well as barriers they face. This report is a first attempt to capture baseline information on women entrepreneurs based on various national data sources such as the labor force survey, business enterprise survey, amongst others. In addition to establishing a baseline, the report provides recommendations on indicators and questions to be included in the upcoming population census of Samoa. The baseline information will also contribute to the implementation plan to support the advancement of women led MSMEs in Samoa.

An in-country programme advisory group (PAG) has been established under the **Trade**, **Commerce and Industry Board** of Samoa. The first PAG meeting, chaired by MCIL, bought together more than 20 representatives from ministries including from Ministry of Women, Community and Social Development, as well as from financial institutions, women entrepreneurs' associations and the private sector, resulting in formalization of a multistakeholder mechanism to address specific barriers faced by women entrepreneurs. The PAG also identified priorities and actions for implementation of gender-specific provisions and goals under the new MSME Policy and Strategy 2020.



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In order to develop a roadmap for implementation of the **MSME Development Policy and Strategy**, ESCAP is supporting MCIL with undertaking analysis of the goals in the policy related to women entrepreneurs and developing a results measurement framework on how these goals can be achieved and monitored. This framework will enable MCIL to develop an implementation plan for ensuring that women owned MSMEs at the provincial levels benefit from the policy.


